

What you need:

- Your Epson printer
- Good quality A4 paper or card
- Scissors
- Glue
- Hole punch or needle (optional)
- String, thread, ornament hangers or thin ribbon (optional)

Instructions:

1. Make sure your printer's properties are set to high quality, colour printing
2. Print and cut out both tree shapes
3. Place the shapes back-to-back and glue together
4. Use a hole punch or needle to make a hole at the top and hang on your tree using string, thread, ribbon or an ornament hanger. Alternatively, glue several copies on string or ribbon to make a Christmas tree garland





What you need:

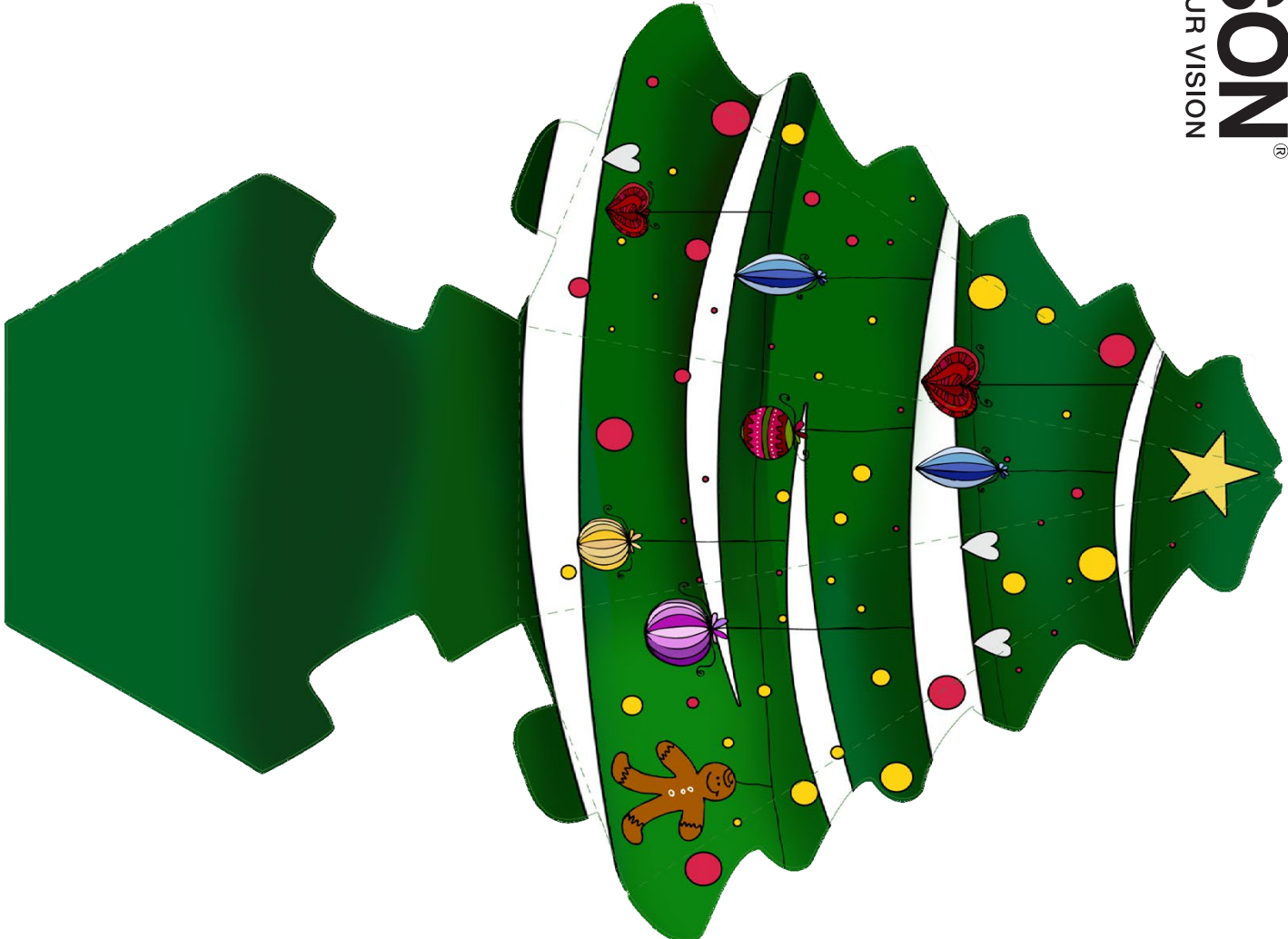
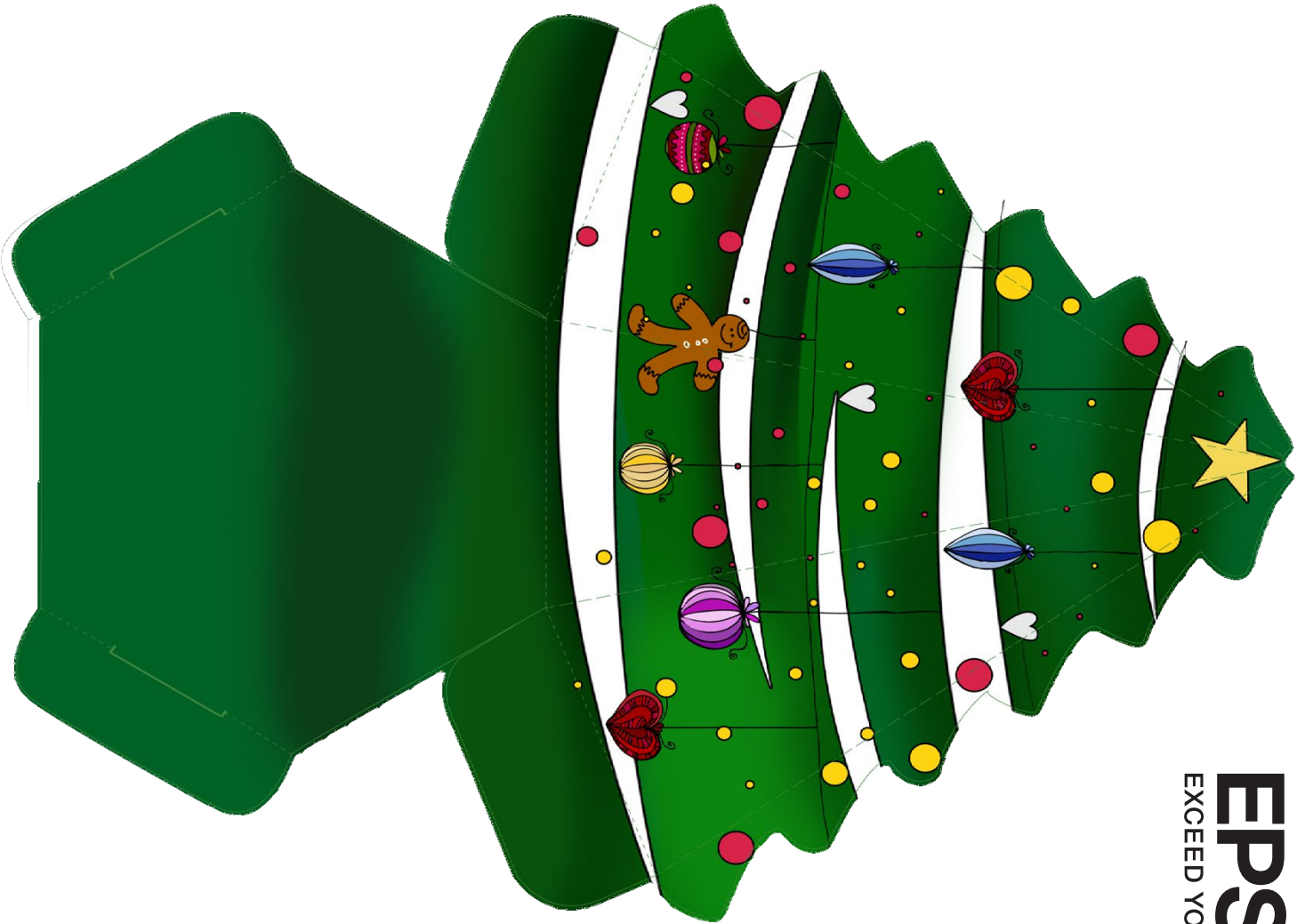
- Your Epson printer
- Good quality A4 card or thick paper
- Scissors
- Glue

Instructions:

1. Make sure your printer's properties are set to high quality, colour printing
2. Print and cut out both shapes
3. Using tree 1, cut out the two slots marked at the bottom. Also make a cut on the short inside edge of each of the two flaps (at the top left and top right of the presents). Fold both flaps along the dotted line
4. Fold along the remaining dotted lines on both shapes
5. Take tree 1 and lay down. Then fold the tree towards you and glue the two large flaps to the base so your tree is standing up. The flaps with the slots should remain free and point up
6. Now take tree 2 and fold along the printed dotted lines. Place the base of tree 2 inside the base of tree 1. Fold the flaps of tree 1 over the base of tree 2, then tuck the tabs on tree 2 into the slots in the base of tree 1
7. Fold the outer, serrated edges of each tree-half (to the outside) and glue the edges together to complete the tree
8. Decorate your home or office with your own miniature Christmas tree

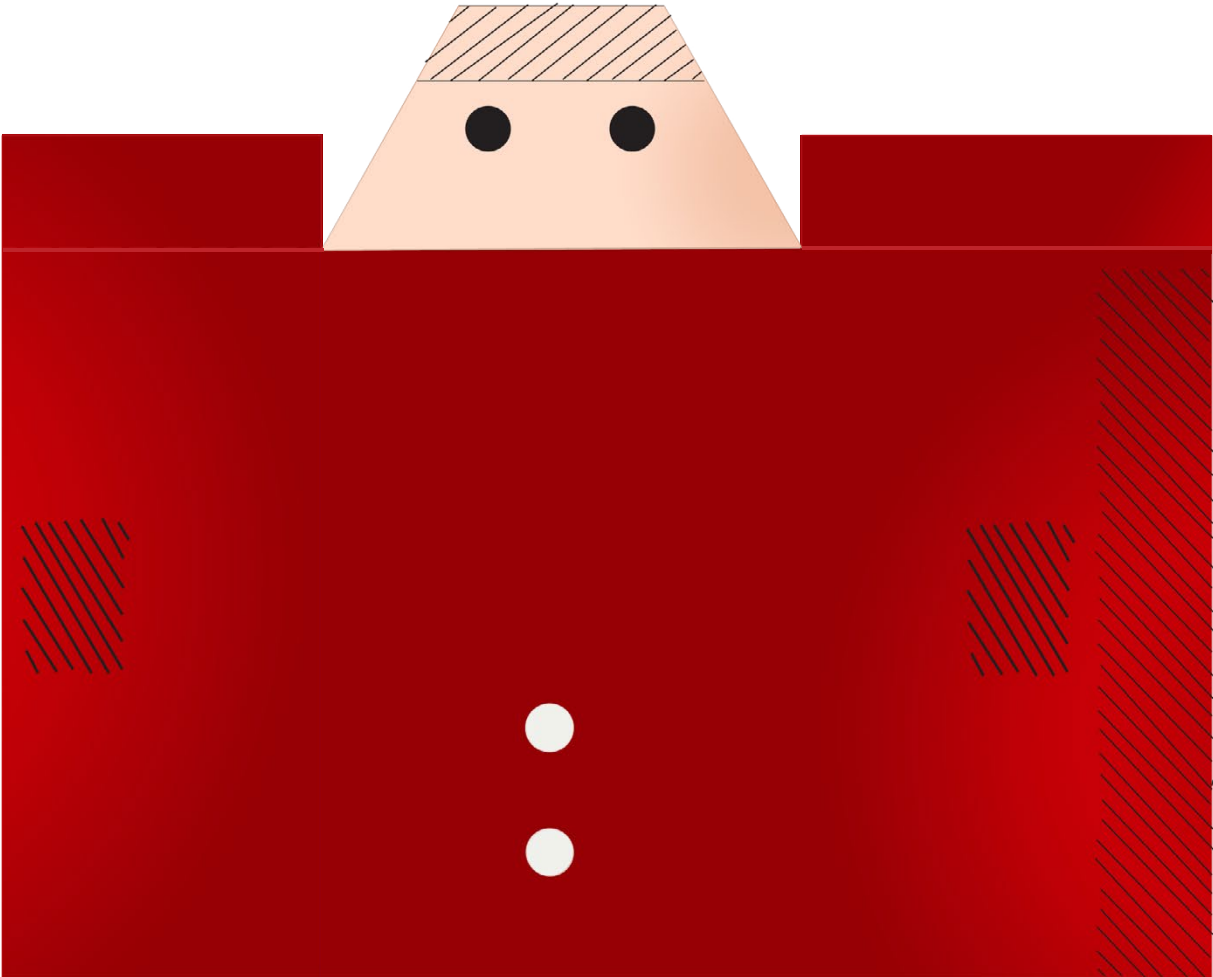
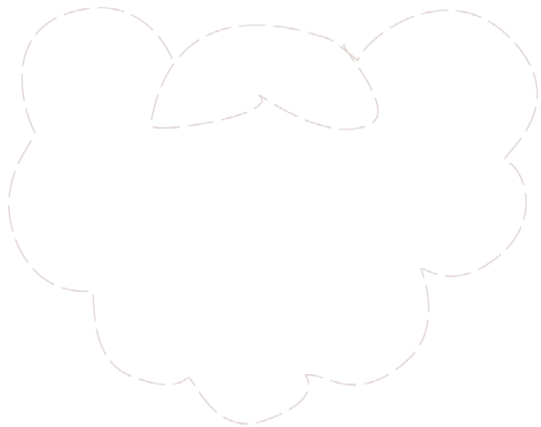
- Your Epson printer
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- Glue

Instructions:

1. Make sure your printer's properties are set to high quality, colour printing
2. Print and cut out all the shapes
3. Roll the main shape into a cylinder and glue the ends together over the crosshatched area to form Santa's body
4. Wrap the belt around Santa's middle and glue the ends to the back of the cylinder to hold it in place
5. Glue the hat onto Santa's head, so the white base covers the crosshatched markings
6. Glue on his beard and then his nose, as shown in the picture
7. Spread a few Santas around the home or office



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- Scissors
- Glue
- Hole punch or needle (optional)
- String, thread, ornament hangers or thin ribbon (optional)

Instructions:

1. Make sure your printer's properties are set to high quality, colour printing
2. Print and cut out all the shapes
3. Using the large red design as your base, glue Santa together piece by piece to match the picture. Start with the part marked 1, then part 2, and so on
4. Use a hole punch or needle to make a hole in Santa's hat and hang on the tree using string, thread, ribbon or an ornament hanger. Alternatively, glue several Santas on string or ribbon to make a Christmas garland. You can also use Santa as he is to decorate tables and surfaces
